At the Hearth of the Community: Filling Gaps in Food Security

- Since pandemic United Way BC has played a significant role in food insecurity
- Community partners looked to us for support and leadership
- Rapidly responded to needs in BC communities
- We filled gaps by:
 - Mobilizing resources and expertise
 - Enhancing collaboration
 - Providing direct support (purchasing power, logistics and a fleet of volunteers) and funding



Regional Community Food Hubs: Strengthening Vital Connections to

Food Addressing pressing needs and leveraging opportunities:

- Partnership building
- Improving efficiency and effectivity of food distribution
- Implementing co-sharing models
- Developing roles for regional coordination
- Investing in sustainable operations
- Strategic, responsive and collaborative approach = less siloing and more impactful response



Improving Community Resilience & Well-being

- Regional Community Food Hubs strengthen vital connections and create an ecosystem of care so that all community members have access to nourishing food they need.
- Place-based, neighbourhood-led Food Hubs strengthen partnerships, build infrastructure and engage with communities in meaningful ways improving health, well-being and resilience for all.



The Hub & Spoke Model

- Regional Community Food Hubs: a **network** of community partners providing a comprehensive and inclusive response to food needs
- Operational model: United Way BC subcontracts a regional service provider = regional "steward"
 - Contract delivery
 - Regional coordination and collaboration
 - Liaising with other service providers "spokes"
- Partnerships between non-profits, local businesses, agricultural sector, private sector, school districts, municipalities
