Micro-generation in Alberta

Generating your own electricity

- To qualify as a micro-generator, you must produce renewable electricity for your own use on property you own or lease.
- You must apply to the distribution company in your service area and meet requirements in AUC Rule 024.
- Solar can help offset your electricity usage and reduce your costs. However, while you're still connected to the grid, you will still receive electricity bills. Systems cannot exceed 5 MW capacity.

Installation & maintenance

- Panel installation requires permits and electrical inspection.
- A qualified installer can help with submitting the application to the distribution service provider. Once approved, installations typically take 1-3 days to complete.
- Contact your retailer to set up billing and apply credits.
- Maintenance typically involves periodic cleaning and inspections. You may consider adding protective screens to prevent damage from animals or debris.

Recycling & decommissioning


Solar panels can last 25+ years, although some parts may need replacement sooner. Recycling options are expanding, check with your installer or municipality for available programs.

Did you know...

Even if you generate your own power, fixed charges like distribution and transmission fees still apply. Systems must not produce more electricity than is consumed on site.
